(1) much

V 次の英文を読んで、以下の設問に答えなさい。

I grew up in South Africa, where it snows once every 20 years, so moving to Winnipeg, one of the coldest cities in the world, took some getting used to. Lisa, whom I went to high school (a), thinks I'm utterly crazy for running in extreme temperatures (b) will frost your eyelashes in the blink of an eye. However, it's entirely possible provided you take certain precautions such as waiting until it warms up a bit when it's colder than minus 40°C. I use a spreadsheet to track what to wear for (c) temperatures and wind chills. The key is to wear layers, (d) a fitted Merino base layer. I'm also very careful with what I wear on my head. When I first started running in winter I asked my husband Kent, who's lived in Winnipeg all his life, (e) it was cold enough for a beanie, and he said no. When I got home and had a hot shower I screamed (f) pain. My ears were fat, red and stiff. Kent then informed me that they would, in all (g), turn black and fall off! Mercifully he was only teasing and they eventually got better and peeled, as if sunburnt. Now I always wear a hat and, if there's a wind chill warning, a neoprene facemask with a hood over the nose and mouth holes. I also cover any (h) skin on my face in Vaseline. Other (i) that, I just wear my summer shoes with wool socks.

There's a real sense of accomplishment at the end of a winter run and a heightened (j) for a warm room and a hot drink. Running in extreme conditions has both an absurdity and levity to it — it makes you feel both adventurous and invincible.

VI 次の英文を読んで、以下の設問に答えなさい。

In my view, one of the most profound culture clashes in the modern world is between those who think hard work in itself is a virtue and those who don't. I fall into the latter category and Japan (on the whole) lives firmly in the former.

In Japan, I very rarely hear anyone say they like their work and yet people seem to take a sort of perverse pride in being subject to long hours. Beneath the complaints I detect a sense that people see it as some sort of endurance test they are passing, or perhaps a proof that they are needed. In Britain, you are far more likely to hear people say they love their jobs, just wish they had shorter hours.

Some of my most jarring moments of culture shock in Japan came when discussing working hours. In my first year in Japan I met a young man who had been given the "honour" of being assistant/secretary to his company president. But his fiancée had broken off their engagement after months of having barely seen him. He apparently returned home after midnight every night and was constantly called to work on weekends. "So quit," I and my English friends advised. "Definitely quit!" we argued when we heard that he wasn't paid overtime, or a salary significantly higher than colleagues his (a).

Years later, there was a national debate over whether to move certain national holidays to the nearest Monday, to create three-day weekends. I found it hard to believe there was even a debate: What could be the possible argument against the chance of a proper (b)? And yet I remember being told by a provincial employee (1) that he was opposed. "It's nice to have two days off but after three days you get out of the routine of work," he said.

I was even more stunned when I heard that the argument for the three-day weekend was not so much "you get time off in a nice chunk" but rather "people might spend more money, thereby stimulating the economy if we do it this way". In other words, it couldn't be presented as a chance to relax a bit.

I remembered that during my studies of the Japanese language I came across an interesting passage about a mysterious Japanese illness called "gogatsu-byō". This illness, apparently, is caused when Japanese people are allowed several days off in (c) during Golden Week.

We also learned to use the phrase "wake ni ikanai" which appeared in the sentence "yasumu wake ni ikanai", which a man with a nasty cold said to his wife. We understood the sentence construction but had to have it (2) a sick man / explained / felt / go / pressured / to / why to work — so as not to inconvenience colleagues.

My experience was the exact opposite: I once formed a strong (d) of a colleague who kept coming into work with a deep wracking cough. "Totally irresponsible. What if we all catch it off him? Really distracting... He would have been better weeks ago if he had just taken a few days off when he first got it."

When I was a student "energy drinks" were not particularly popular in Britain. So I was curious about these expensive little potions when I saw them advertised in Japan. I distrusted them as they seemed to be, essentially, industrial strength caffeine with a few other things thrown in. But it was explained to me that people used them in extremis, to enable them to stay awake at the desk and survive work crises.

By the mid-90s these had arrived in the UK. It took me a little while to (3) put my finger on what the difference was: In Britain, they are used primarily by party goers who don't want to conk out at a wild dance party at 3 am. People wanted energy to party, rather than (e).
